

Unwanted Kit

What exactly is the Unwanted Kit?

Misoprostol, on the other hand, is the medication you will take second. Misoprostol causes the uterus to contract so that your body passes the pregnancy contents. The Unwanted Kit contains four 200 mcg tablets of misoprostol.

How much does an Unwanted Kit cost?

The price of an Unwanted Kit will depend on where you are located. Typically, the Unwanted Kit can be between Rs 386 to Rs 400.

How do I take the Unwanted Kit?

As aforementioned, the Unwanted Kit comes with one mifepristone pill and four misoprostol pills. The procedure for taking these medications is as follows:

- Start by taking one mifepristone pill (200 mg) with water orally.
- Wait between 24 to 48 hours before taking the next medication, mifepristone.
- Put the four misoprostol pills under the tongue (also known as sublingually). Let them sit for 30 minutes, allowing them to dissolve. At the end of the 30 minutes, you can swallow the remainder of the pills.

Though this protocol is relatively straightforward, there are certain things to consider when taking the Unwanted Kit:

- Some individuals may require an additional round of misoprostol (e.g., another four pills of misoprostol).
- If you vomit within the initial 30 minutes of taking mifepristone, you will likely require another mifepristone pill.

How do I prepare for the Unwanted Kit?

After taking the pills in the Unwanted Kit, specifically misoprostol, you may experience some uncomfortable side effects. Therefore, it is best to clear your schedule, if possible, the day that you take the misoprostol pills to allow yourself time to rest.

It would also be helpful to have certain medications and tools on hand. For certain side effects, pain relievers and a heating pad can be helpful. To help manage bleeding, have your feminine hygiene products of choice on hand.

What happens after taking the Unwanted Kit?

The Unwanted Kit, though very effective, can cause some unpleasant side effects. The main side effects include cramping. Usually, cramping resolves within a day, while bleeding can last for a number of days afterwards. This is completely normal and to be expected.

You can manage cramping with over-the-counter pain reliever such as Tylenol or ibuprofen. Rest and a heating pad can also be helpful. You can manage the bleeding the same way you do with your period with whatever is most comfortable to use. You can use pads, tampons, or a menstrual cup.

You may also experience nausea. Certain medications like ondansetron can help to manage feelings of an upset stomach.

Can anybody not take the Unwanted Kit?

If you have any of the following conditions, you should not take the Unwanted Kit:

- Bleeding disorders
- Allergy to misoprostol or mifepristone
- Allergy to prostaglandins
- Suspected ectopic pregnancy
- Use of an intrauterine device (IUD)
- Anemia

Additionally, certain drugs might interact with the medication in the Unwanted Kit. These include, but are not limited to, ketoconazole, erythromycin, rifampicin, dexamethasone, phenytoin, itraconazole, cyclosporine, phenobarbital, tacrolimus, carbamazepine, sirolimus, and ergotamine.
